
The Challenge

Downtowns and main streets are the beating hearts of Canada's communities. They are where people gather, build businesses, create culture, and connect to public services and civic life. More than 85% of Canadians live within a kilometre of a main street, and over 280,000 small businesses located in these areas employ nearly two million people and generate more than \$300 billion annually. Prior to the pandemic, the downtowns of Canada's six largest cities occupied on average of just 0.2% of their metro areas' land, but generated 15% of GDP and 17% of jobs. Even now, facing significant challenges, downtowns produce a disproportionate share of economic value to their cities, including crucial tax revenues to provide essential municipal services.




