

FLOODING ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

Local flood response and sandbags

Municipalities are responsible for on-the-ground flood response during a flooding emergency and may request provincial assistance. Find your municipality's website at www.ontario.ca/page/list-ontario-municipalities.

In coordination with other organizations, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) may also provide public safety services to Indigenous communities and unincorporated/unorganized areas, including activities such as emergency evacuations and providing support in acquiring sandbags.

If you live in an unincorporated or unorganized area, your local MNRF work centre is responsible for supporting flooding emergencies. If you live within an Indigenous community, support for flooding emergencies may be a shared responsibility between Indigenous Services Canada (ISC), Emergency Management Ontario and your local MNRF work centre. Contact ISC at www.canada.ca/en/indigenous-services-canada.html.

Local flood monitoring support

Conservation authorities and MNRF monitor watershed and weather conditions to assess flood potential within their areas of jurisdiction, and issue flood messages. Local flood notifications inform the public of developing unsafe river and lake conditions. Find your conservation authority at conservation-authority.

Provincial flood monitoring

MNRF is responsible for flood management in Ontario. The ministry works with conservation authorities, Environment and Climate Change Canada and many others (e.g., water control boards) to assess when and where flood conditions are likely to occur. Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) staff work closely with First Nations at risk of flooding and partners to help ensure emergency preparedness and response plans are in place, as well as funding eligible flood mitigation preparedness and response measures.
