Why this matters to councils



Libraries are trusted, nonpartisan civic infrastructure.



They deliver measurable ROI, reduce service duplication and fill gaps.



They anchor downtowns and rural main streets, supporting local economies.



They are where residents already go—for learning, services, and connection.

Promising practice: Hamilton Public Library

On-site social workers connect residents to housing, ID, benefits, and mental-health supports

Reduces pressure on emergency and by-law services; faster referrals, earlier interventions

Built with municipal & academic partners; evaluation framework in place



Promising practice: Innisfil ideaLAB & Library

Makerspace & digital media labs grow local skills and entrepreneurship

Hands-on STEAM: enrichment for children and youth; supports tourism & small business branding Flexible civic space for performances, co-working, and community collaborations



Promising practice: Toronto Public Library – Wi-Fi Hotspots

Hundreds of loanable hotspots extend broadband into homes—key for learners & jobseekers

Program aligned with
City's Poverty
Reduction Strategy;
sustained by multi-year
contracts

Model replicable at any scale: from small pilots to county-wide programs



Promising practice: Vaughan Public Libraries – Newcomer Settlement

Library Settlement Partnership (LSP): settlement workers co-located in library branches One-stop access to language, employment and community services in many languages

Strengthens inclusion, reduces duplication, and speeds up integration

What councils can do in the next 6 months

- Co-fund or expand hotspot lending and device access with your library
- Co-locate municipal counters/pop-ups (permits, taxes, transit cards) in branches
- Use shared dashboards: align library metrics with Community Safety & Well-Being plans
- Back provincial modernization (ODPL) and leverage joint grants/federal programs

Call to action for AMO delegates

Ask	Ask your library CEO for ideas and suggestions for collaboration
Earmark	Earmark modest innovation funds for library-led pilots with clear KPIs
Adopt	Adopt a joint municipal-library Digital Equity Plan for 2026 budgets
Champion	Champion Ontario Digital Public Library (ODPL) to stretch local dollars further

How it came to be

Monday, July 31, 2023, Council Resolution

Whereas Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a book gifting program that mails free, high-quality books to children from birth to age five, no matter their family's income, and was recently expanded to include Canadian cities; and

Whereas the government of Canada website states that removing barriers to literacy would greatly improve all children's chances at success, encourage children to take more initiative, have higher self-esteem, stretch their imagination, and show that books are an important way to get information; and

Whereas supporting this initiative aligns with the corporate strategic goal to promote quality of life advantages within our youngest demographic, and

Whereas investing in our youth is a key to continued growth within our community that will have positive impacts on our citizens for generations.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that staff review and report back to Council concerning the process of enrolling the City of Sault Ste Marie in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library;

Further it be resolved that staff seek a possible partnership with not for profit organization(s) to help finance this initiative.







More permanent solution Goal: 500 in the program

- Based on census data and the calculator provided on the Dolly Parton Imagination Library website, Sault Ste. Marie has approximately 3,040 children in the 0-5 age group.
- The cost per book averages \$3.85, and with twelve books per year, the cost per child is \$46 each year.
- **Year 1**: 20% of children is \$11,393
- Year 5: under a full subscription scenario \$230,528
- 2025 Budget: Yearly Council to allocate \$10,000 to support the Library



Moving forward

- 476 children are in the program. 46 have graduated, and 9 are on the waitlist (but there could be more).
- It costs approximately \$1,835 a month to keep the program running with 476 children.
- Worked with DSSAB to ensure books were getting into the hands of children in social services programming.
- In the 24 hours between posting that parents could apply online, Communications staff had to turn off the online option as applications for 143 children were received, reaching (beyond) capacity.
